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1. MISSION OF THE STUDY PROGRAM

In the context of its mission, the Doctoral School of History, aims to develop competent human resources in the field of scientific research, with doctoral studies constituting a professional research experience. This experience culminates in the awarding of a doctoral degree, in accordance with the law, following the successful defense of a doctoral thesis. The overall objective of the Doctoral School of History is to train and prepare high-level academic specialists who can become autonomous, creative, and critically thinking researchers. These individuals should be capable of conceiving and conducting original research, grounded in advanced methods, which contribute to the advancement of scientific knowledge both within specific areas and in interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary fields surrounding the domain of History. Within the framework of the advanced training program and scientific research, doctoral students are provided with the necessary conditions for developing professional competencies (in content, cognition, and research) in the specialized field of History, as well as in cross-cutting competencies.

A. Professional Competencies:

- a) Advanced knowledge in the fields of doctoral studies;
- b) The ability to identify, formulate, and solve research problems;
- c) Mastery of advanced research methods and techniques;
- d) Knowledge of research project management;
- e) Proficiency in new research procedures and solutions;
- f) Skills in researching, drafting, and utilizing scientific papers;
- g) Academic-level linguistic skills in international languages necessary for research and scientific paper documentation and development;
- h) Understanding and the ability to apply the principles and values of research ethics in the fields of doctoral studies.

- a) The ability to use new technologies in information and communication fields;
- b) Interpersonal and teamwork skills;
- c) Taking responsibility and the ability to organize and lead professional groups, scientific research teams, or institutions in the specialized field;
